### **Updated Information on Face Coverings**


Face coverings are now mandatory in churches. There is an exemption for those who are officiating at services and presiding at Holy Communion, and those who assist them (for instance by reading, preaching, or leading prayers) who do not always need to wear a face covering, although one should be worn if physical distancing cannot be maintained (such as at the distribution of Holy Communion).

In line with government advice, children under 11 and people with disabilities or certain health conditions are also exempt from wearing face coverings.

Please do not come into church if you think you may have symptoms of Covid 19.

#### Introducing the Rev'd Canon Paul Richardson

We look forward to welcoming Paul to the Benefice as Associate Vicar with special responsibility for Ashbury, Longcot and Fernham later this year.



I am delighted that those who make these decisions have given me the opportunity to join you all in the Benefice of Shrivenham and Ashbury. Katriona and I look forward to moving into St Mary's House, Ashbury in the autumn.

My early years were in a mining village in Northumberland until the age of 8 when my father was ordained, leaving his job in a local factory to start his curacy in the Coquet valley. Here he served villages from Hepple to Pauperhaugh, Rothbury being the centre of the benefice. So I grew up in a rural, largely agricultural community in the foothills of the Cheviots, and with a strong sense of the presence of the ancient Northern saints, St Aidan and St Cuthbert. Moves took the family to Hexham, then to the coastal village of Chevington before I left home to study Botany at University in Cardiff.

During my time as an undergraduate my sense of vocation grew stronger, and I was selected for ordination training at Ridley Hall, Cambridge. Ministry has led me from a curacy to other posts in North West England, before moving down South to Wiltshire and Salisbury diocese 20 years ago. In my current post in Devizes, I met Norma and Richard who lived and served in the neighbouring parish of Bromham. It will be a real pleasure to be with them in the ministry team at Shrivenham and Ashbury. My wife Katriona and I, our two Jack Russell dogs, Rolo and Tala, and our three grown up and "fled the nest" sons look forward to our new life in Oxfordshire. Yours, Paul

#### **News from the Bell Ringers**



Little did we know in March that church bells could be silent for many months. Fortunately, Shrivenham clock was converted to electric winding in 1973. This gave the clock winder a respite from his twice weekly labours and meant our chimes could continue through the pandemic and remind everyone of St Andrew's. Elsewhere, they had to climb the tower and stop the clock before the huge weights grounded and the wires unravelled. By amazing coincidence, the drain digging for St Andrew's toilet & kitchen revealed the old clock weights, redundant in 1973 and simply dumped in the churchyard, to the amazement of the digger driver who could not work out what he had unearthed.

We recovered 80% of the weights, or about ½ ton!

Now to decide how to display them!

The pandemic hasn't entirely stopped ringing. Instead of Longcot practice, a group assembles on Friday via

of Longcot practice, a group assembles on Friday via Facebook using a tool called RingingRoom to socialise and practice change ringing. Needless to say, it isn't like the real thing, but has benefitted some learners who have developed new skills which they will try when practices eventually resume.

Ringing chambers were never designed to work during a pandemic with ringers in a smallish room, in some cases poorly ventilated, standing close together and sharing the same ropes. Nevertheless, I worked with the Central Council of Church Bell Ringers, who worked with CofE & PHE, and by early July, we agreed a method whereby many of the 7,000 churches with bells could return to service ringing under controlled conditions.

On Sunday 12th July, a selected group of five ringers including a family of three rang for the 11am service at Longcot, to the delight of those listening. By ringing an arpeggio rather than a scale and with open doors, we met distancing and ventilation requirements.

Our young learner then chimed another bell just before the service started!
