Ashbury Cycle of Prayer

Although we are not allowed to sing them in church this year, if you asked friends or family to name their favourite Christmas Carols, I suspect you would get similar answers – O Come all ye Faithful, Hark the Herald, O Little Town of Bethlehem and Joy to the World would feature highly.

Of course, music scholars might argue that these are actually not carols at all. The word 'carol' is derived from the Greek *choraules* (a flute-player for chorus dancing). In medieval times, 'carol' meant a round-dance with song. A soloist often sang the verse with everyone joining in the refrain, during which the singers might hold hands and dance round in a circle.

As a result, there is hardly a carol service in the UK where the congregation will sing a genuine carol, mostly these are now left to the choir – minus the hand holding and dancing!

The majority of what most of us call Christmas Carols today were either originally composed or arranged after 1840, a result of the Victorian revival of Christmas. The old form of carol, almost forgotten in England was reinvented and became Christmas themed hymns about the Nativity. Alongside the old carol' there were also many new ones. However, many of the new carols that we sing today were actually new texts set to old tunes or new settings of old texts. I. like most people, have been hearing and singing carols for as long as I can remember - it is hard to avoid them. However, the words of the carols took on a new meaning for me two years ago when I was lucky enough to visit Bethlehem. The words that I had sung for more than forty years came to life as I stood in the historic city and looked down into the surrounding fields, trying to work out where the shepherds may

For me though nothing says "Christmas" in the same way as Once in Royal David's City, sung by the choir of Kings College, Cambridge just after 3pm on Christmas Eve. Whatever has gone before, that is when

have tended their sheep.

Whatever has gone before, that is when Christmas starts for me.

We are still a few weeks away but when we do get there may I wish you a Happy Christmas.


