Are you a human doing or a human being?

Earlier this week, Richard and I attended (by Zoom of course) the first part of a four-week course on contemplation. Not your ordinary wool gathering or staring into space but trying to understand and recapture for ourselves the meditative practices of the Christian fathers as a way of coming closer to God. Our teacher reminded us that not only is it OK to spend time in quiet contemplation, it's positively good for our mental and spiritual health.

If we are to obey the psalmist's instruction to "Be still and know that I am God" we first need to be still.


To be present in the present.

Thinking about it afterwards, I was reminded of a lecturer who began his talk with a confession that it had not been a good day. Lying in bed, he had been looking forward to breakfast; at breakfast he and colleagues were planning the morning; mid-morning he was looking forward to lunch; but at lunchtime ... You can see where this is going. Yes, he had done a lot during the day, but he had been so busy doing that he had forgotten to just to be. He hadn't taken the time to enjoy those last few minutes in bed, or the meals, or the company of others. He hadn't really been present in any of it. And he certainly hadn't been present to God. In a phrase echoed by our teacher this week, he had been a human doing, not a human being.

The picture of an Advent calendar on today's sheet is a timely reminder of the importance of taking the time to be still as wait for the coming of the Christ child. Such calendars help us to be intentional about marking the days rather than rushing through them, so that we will have come to know God and be ready to meet him when he comes.

Whatever else you are doing this week, I wish you the time to be still.
