Ash for Ash Wednesday

By far the easiest option is to purchase it!

However, if you're feeling brave please follow the instructions below. Once you have ash you can either use it with us as part of our online service at 6pm on Ash Wednesday (17th February) or have your own reflective time at home.

Find last year's Palm Cross (could be the hardest bit), a lighter/matches and a bowl you're happy to burn things in! Last year I used a wok, which is very forgiving. It's best to do this outside unless you enjoy the smell of smoke in your house and the sound of the smoke alarm going off as you work. Unfold the cross before burning. Some websites recommend pushing your ash through a sieve to make it fine. You could use a pestle and mortar – or small people might like to help using their fingers. Mix your ash with a little oil (approx ½ tsp per 1 palm cross) in the lid of an old jam jar, then put the jar on top to keep it safe until Ash Wednesday.
